Central Louisiana Economic Dashboard

The Central Louisiana Economic Dashboard is a service of the LSUA College of Business to help business and community leaders monitor the economic pulse of central Louisiana.

"Online sales tax revenue surged in October due to an increase in the number of remote sellers," says Randall Dupont, Dean of the LSUA College of Business. Online sales tax revenue for Rapides increased 168% in October to \$1,314,574 from \$489,992 a month earlier, the highest for the parish since the new remote sellers' collection system was established. Among the 11 CENLA parishes, online tax revenues totaled \$3.5 million compared to \$1.6 million a month earlier. Year-to-date, revenues are up 30% in CENLA, and 36% in Rapides and Natchitoches parishes.

"The tax revenue increase is largely due to the increased number of retailers participating in the remote sales tax collection system," says Dupont. The remote seller collection system more accurately matches sales tax revenue with the parish as sales taxes are charged at the location of the sale. This differs from the old voluntary direct marketer's system in which the local portion of sales taxes was distributed based on population. The remote seller system collects the actual tax where the sale is made, and the state redistributes it accordingly.

According to the Louisiana Remote Sellers Commission, the agency processed 2,500 returns in the first quarter of FY 2021, when it started in July 2020. 8,800 returns were processed in the same period last year, and 17,000 in the first quarter FY 2023.

LSUA Partners with LSUE to Bring Surgical Technology Degree to Central Louisiana

SUP LSUA and LSUE commit to a Health Professions Collaborative Agreement to bring a Surgical Technology degree to central Louisiana.

A survey of the healthcare organizations in central Louisiana is conducted annually by the Department of Allied Health at Louisiana State University at Alexandria (LSUA) to determine the need for allied health professionals in the region. The most recent survey indicated a growing need for Surgical Technologists along with a host of other technical professions in Allied Health. Considering no local training program for Surgical Technologists is available, finding individuals with the training necessary to work in many of these professions is difficult for area healthcare providers.

In an effort to meet the need for trained health professionals in central Louisiana, LSUA and LSUE will work together to provide the necessary training to LSUA and LSUE students interested in pursuing a career in health professions not offered on their particular campus.

LSUA College of Allied Heath Dean Haywood Joiner, Ph.D., said, "We are thankful for our healthcare partners in the region, and they have identified the need for Surgical Techs to bolster their workforce.

The Rapides Foundation Awards \$4.5 million in Future of HealthC.A.R.E. Grants

The Rapides Foundation has awarded five grants totaling \$4,450,025 to address shortages in the Central Louisiana healthcare workforce by developing an ongoing pool of K-12 students are interested in healthcare careers and are academically prepared to succeed in postsecondary training programs.

Future of HealthC.A.R.E. (Career, Academic Readiness and Exploration for Students) Program grants have been awarded to the Catahoula Parish School Board, Central Louisiana Area Health Education Center, Louisiana State University of Alexandria, Northwestern State University and Louisiana Central.

The Future of HealthC.A.R.E. grant is offered Foundation's under the Healthcare Access Initiative and complements the Foundation's Healthcare Occupations Program, which was created in 2016 and funds projects at the postsecondary level.

The Foundation launched the Future of HealthC.A.R.E. grant in 2022 to target students in grades K-12 within the Foundation's nine-parish service area. Grants were awarded in September. Grantees started a planning period on November 1 with implementation beginning in June 2023.

Louisiana Central awarded \$600,000 grant from The Rapides Foundation to create Healthcare Career Central



Louisiana Central was awarded a three-vear 5600,000 grant to create Healthcare Career CENTRAL Central, the first regional healthcare career highway initiative in Central Louisiana.

The Healthcare Career Central initiative is funded by a Future of HealthC.A.R.E. Program Grant from The Rapides Foundation. Through its Future of HealthC.A.R.E. (Career, Academic Readiness and Exploration for Students) Program Grant, the Foundation seeks to increase the number of qualified Central Louisiana Students enrolling in healthcare training programs or entering into the healthcare workforce. The Foundation awarded a total of \$4.5 million in grants under the program.

Healthcare Career Central will collaboratively link employers, training providers and other partners to students, teachers, counselors and parents through a central website, social media campaign, and ongoing communication and networking events.

"The goal is to expose more students to the diverse local careers in healthcare, the pathways to those careers, and the resources available along the way," Lafe Jones, Vice President and Executive Director of Industry Relations at Louisiana Central said. "We appreciate The Rapides Foundation's focus on the future healthcare workforce. Louisiana Central is excited to be part of the solution, and we look forward to working collaboratively with other grant recipients on our common goal."

Louisiana Central has been working the past few months with a group of healthcare leaders to understand the sector's current and future workforce challenges. Based on provider input and guidance, Healthcare Career Central was developed. This planning group, the Louisiana Central Healthcare Alliance, will continue to grow to allow for provider participation in the development of this innovative healthcare career pathway.

US Department of Labor Announces \$90M **Funding Opportunity to Support Delivery of** Academic, Skills, Training, Employment **Services for Young People**



To help remove academic and training barriers faced by young people, the U.S. Department of Labor today announced a \$90

million funding opportunity in YouthBuild Program grants to support pre-apprenticeships in highdemand industries including construction, healthcare, information technology and hospitality. Grants will support occupational skills training, employment services and educational guidance to disadvantaged young people, from ages 16 to 24, in communities where barriers to basic academic and career skills development exist.

Administered by the department's Employment and Administration, and supported the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, the grants will fund approximately 75 projects nationwide with individual grants ranging from \$700,000 to \$1.5 million. The funding opportunity follows the department's 2021 guidance that prioritizes quality jobs, green building and community violence intervention.

In August 2022, the department added the Youth-Build program to the Biden-Harris administration's Justice40 initiative, which aims to ensure that 40 percent of the overall benefits of certain federal investments flow to disadvantaged communities that are overburdened by pollution.

Dupont says the Commission does not see any impact on brick-and-mortar stores as much of the increase is the result of retailers switching from the direct marketer's system. Nevertheless, he says the remote seller system will provide a more equitable distribution of tax revenue to central Louisiana parishes.

Work Opportunity Tax Credits (WOTC)

WOTC is one tool in a diverse toolbox of flexible strategies designed to help move people into gainful employment and obtain on-the-job experience. It joins other tax credits, education, and workforce training and development programs that help American workers with barriers to employment prepare for good jobs; case their transition from job to job; benefit from the creation of effective regional economic development strate-

Fidelity Bonding

The Louisiana Work-Commission force (LWC) offers bonding services for hard-toplace job seekers under the Fidelity Bonding Program. The federal bonding program provides insurance to employers that protects against employee dishonesty and acts as an incentive to hire at-risk applicants, including Returning Citizens (exoffenders). Fidelity Bonding covers theft, forgery, larceny and Bond embezzlement. insurance issued ranges from \$5,000 - \$25,000 for a 6-month period with no deductible. The bond can be issued to employers once the applicant has received a job offer with a scheduled start date.

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Health Professions Scholarship Program (HPSP)

Are you an aspiring nurse who's interested in caring for America's veterans? If so, the Department of



the Health Professionals Scholarship Program (HPSP).

Through the HPSP, the VA is offering educational assistance in the form of tuition, and a monthly stipend of \$1,184 a month to students pursuing a Licensed Vocational/Practical Nursing Degree (LVN/LPN), an Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) or a Bachelor's of Science in Nursing (BSN). After graduation, they will be employed at one of the VA facilities in the Alexandria, Lafayette, and Lake Charles LA region.

Key Requirements:

- U.S. citizenship (U.S. Veterans will be considered first among all equally qualified candidates).
- Enrollment in a qualified degree program (LVN/LPN/ADN).
- The applicant must be willing to be employed full-time within the Alexandria, Lafayette, and Lake Charles LA regions.
- Selection criteria includes academic performance, work experience, faculty and employer recommendations, and career goals.
- All candidates will be subject to a background/suitability investigation.
- To officially accept the scholarship, selected applicants must sign a mobility agreement as well as an agreement to complete a service obligation of at least 2 years at a VA health care facility after graduating and obtaining necessary licensure/certification.

RoyOMartin Receives APA Awards

The APA – The Engineered Wood Association visited RoyOMartin-Plywood and Oakdale-OSB on November 29, 2022 and honored both manufacturing facilities with its 2021 awards.

RoyOMartin-Plywood received the 2021 3-Year Safety Award in the Division I Plywood category. The award recognizes the truly world-class safety culture at the mill. Of the 14 mills in the category, Chopin's work incident rate was 6.72 times lower than the other mills in the category. In addition, the Total Incident Rate (TIR) at the mill was 4.35 times lower than the average of all 14 plywood mills evaluated over the last three years.

"We are fortunate to have a team at Chopin that not only understands the importance of working safely but believes that all accidents can be prevented," stated Vice President of Plywood Jeremy Burford. "We have earned the title of the Safest Plywood Mill in North America because of the focus of these great employees."

Plywood received a second honor from the APA, first place for the 2021 Annual Safety & Health Award in the Division I Plywood category.

RoyOMartin Oakdale-OSB received second place for the 2021 Annual Safety & Health Award in the Division II OSB category. There were 35 mills evaluated in the category, and Oakdale was one of only ten with a work incident rate of 0.00 in 2021. Along with only 13 other mills, Oakdale is a part of the association's Incident Free Honor Society for 2021.



The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a U.S. government program run by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) program to help low-income households pay for internet service and connected devices like a laptop or tablet.

You are likely eligible if your household's income is below 200% of the Federal Poverty Line, or if you or someone you live with currently receives a government benefit like SNAP, Medicaid, SSI, WIC, Pell Grant, or Free and Reduced-Price Lunch.

If your household is eligible, you could receive:

- Up to a \$30/month discount on your internet service
- Up to a \$75/month discount if your household is on qualifying Tribal lands
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, tablet, or desktop computer (with a co-payment of more than \$10 but less than \$50
- A low cost service plan that may be fully covered through the ACP

Only one monthly service discount and one device discount is allowed per household. To receive the connected device discount, consumers need to enroll in the ACP with a participating provider that offers connected devices (Note: not all internet company offer device discounts.) The internet company will provide the discount to the consumer.
