The goal of Y.E.S. is to identify the disconnected youth in Rapides Parish and to connect them with resources within the American Job Center and with external partners. Disconnected youth are defined as young adults ages 16 to 24 who are not employed and not in school.

The focus of this grant will center around identifying, recruiting, and

connecting disconnected youth in Rapides Parish to employment and educational opportunities. It allows us to partner up with communities and link them together to provide resources such as securing clothing for potential interviews, getting them connected with area youth groups, aiding with mental health issues, facilitating continuing education, or finding a job that fits their interest level.

Seasonally Adjusted Employed Data Shows Record Breaking Data for Third Consecutive Month

Data released today by the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics shows that Louisiana's seasonally adjusted employed data is at a record high for the third consecutive month.

The number of seasonally adjusted employed for May 2023 is 2,039,425, a new record high for the series. The number of employed saw a gain of 2,510 individuals from the April revised estimate of 2,036,915, which was the prior record high. Compared to May 2022, the number of seasonally adjusted employed individuals increased by 20,193.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for May 2023 is 3.6 percent. The rate is tied for the second-lowest rate in series history. The rate shows no change from the April 2023 figure but increased by 0.1 percentage points from May 2022.

Initial Unemployment Insurance Claims Rise for Week Ending June 3

The initial unemployment insurance claims for the week ending June 3, 2023, rose to 2,770 from the week ending May 27, 2023, a total of 2,447. For a comparison, during the week ending June 4, 2022, 2,094 initial claims were filed.

The four-week moving average of initial claims increased to 2,321 from the previous week's average of 2,054.

The unemployment insurance continued claims for the week ending June 3, 2023, increased to 12,450 from the week ending May 27, 2023, a total of 12,092. The continued claims were above the comparable figure of 10,820 for the week ending June 4, 2022.

The four-week moving average of continued claims increased to 11,840 from the previous week's average of 11,515.





The Orchard Foundation Seeks Early Literacy Instructors

The Orchard Foundation is looking for individuals with education or early childhood development expertise to serve as instructors for its Read to Soar and Math to Build On early literacy programs.

Read to Soar and Math to Build On are free, eight-session early literacy workshops for children ages 5 and under and their parents or caregivers. These family sessions help develop and strengthen a culture of reading at home by educating parents, building a child's home library, and increasing awareness about community resources to help ensure the child has the tools for school success.

The responsibilities of the instructors - called Early Childhood Literacy Specialists include facilitating workshops according to an identified curriculum, developing community partnerships and program locations within assigned parishes, and recruiting participants. Work Opportunity Tax Credits (WOTC)

WOTC is one tool in a diverse toolbox of flexible strategies designed to help move people into gainful employment and obtain on-the-job experience. It joins other tax credits, education, and workforce training and development prohelp grams that American workers with barriers to employment prepare for good jobs; case their transition from job to job; benefit from the creation of effective regional economic development strategies; and create high performance workplaces.

Fidelity Bonding

The Louisiana Workforce Commission (LWC) offers bonding services for hard-toplace job seekers under the Fidelity Bonding Program. The federal bonding program provides insurance to employers that protects against employee dishonesty and acts as an incentive to hire at-risk applicants, including Returning Citizens (exoffenders). Fidelity Bonding covers theft, forgery, larceny and Bond embezzlement. insurance issued ranges from \$5,000 - \$25,000 for a 6-month period with no deductible. The bond can be issued to employers once the applicant has received a job offer with a scheduled start date.

WIOA Youth Work Experience Program

The WIOA (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act) Youth Work Experience Program provides meaningful work experience opportunities for young adults ages 17-24.

Students are uniquely positioned with employers to receive training and guidance that will allow them young to develop positive work habits and other critical skill sets necessary to secure sustainable future employment. Our goal is also for these students to have meaningful work experience in a safe environment where they walk away with skills and experience to better prepare them for the world of work.

There are fifteen (15) youth participating this summer. These youth are placed in a variety of professional settings such as dental offices, law firms, pediatric clinics, pharmacies, and several different municipal departments including recreation and utilities for the town of Boyce.

On-the-Job Training Program

Chris is a single 21 year old male, who was living in Natchitoches Parish with his parents. His parents were only able to help with room and board. He recently graduated from Northwestern State University with a BS in Business Administration. Chris was hired at Ratcliff Construction in Alexandria as a Human Resource Intern, working 40 hours a week, making \$11.00 per hour. His annualized total income was \$6382.20, which qualified him as low-income. He was driving daily to Alexandria from Natchitoches. Chris was offered an upgrade position at Ratcliff Construction to be trained as a Human Resource Coordinator. Ratcliff Construction contacted the center to see if he might qualify for On-The-Job training. Chris qualified in the WIOA Adult program as an upgrade for OJT training.

Chris started on May 30, 2022 as a Human Resource Coordinator with Ratcliff Construction Company. He was paid a rate of \$17.00 per hour while training for the approved 1,146 hours. Ratcliff Construction Company was reimbursed a rate of \$8.50 per hour for a total of \$10,000.00. The training hours were from May 30, 2022 through January 12, 2023.

Since Chris started the OJT program, he was married and was able to get his own place to live. His supervisor, C. Hathorn, stated that Chris had completed his OJT training with Ratcliff Construction and has been hired on as a full-time Human Resource Generalist making \$22.50 per hour at 40 hours per week effective January 13, 2023.

Labor Force Participation Rate for People Ages 25 to 54 in May 2023 Highest since January 2007

The labor force participation rate for people age 16 and older was 62.6 percent in May 2023. That was 0.7 percentage point below its February 2020 level, before the COVID-19 pandemic began. The labor force participation rate for people ages 25 to 54 has returned to its pre-pandemic level. The rate was 83.4 percent in May 2023. The last time it was this high was January 2007.

The labor force participation rate for women ages 25 to 54 was 77.6 percent in May 2023,

0.6 percentage point above what it was in February

2020. This group's recovery comes after worries of lower labor force participation for women as they cared for children home from school during the pandemic or other relatives. Among men ages 25 to 54, the labor force participation rate was 89.1 percent in May 2023, having returned to its prepandemic level in April 2023.




